JUDGE BENJAMIN ARANDA III/TORRANCE KIWANIS SCHOLARSHIP LUNCHEON

Benjamin Aranda III, a Los Angeles Municipal Court judge in Torrance for nearly two decades and a nationally known spokesman for minorities in the legal profession, died at the age of 58 in 1998. He was a founding member of our Torrance Kiwanis Club. Judge Aranda died of insulin shock while flying from Los Angeles to Nashville to attend an American Bar Assn. Conference. He had been scheduled to receive the Inspirational Spirit of Excellence Award there from the Association's Commission on Opportunities for Minorities in the Profession. Our scholarship program was created in his memory and in recognition of his contributions to our community and the community at large. Blake Gideon – Shery High School




Candace Wu – West High School

Youth Council and cofounder of Future Business Leaders of America at West HS. She has served as an ambassador for Hugh O'Brian Leadership and volunteered for Cliff Numark and Janice Hahn's political campaigns. Candace has a weighted GPA 4.02 and is in the top 10% of her class. She has challenged herself with demanding coursework currently enrolled in AP Government and Politics, Macroeconomics, English Literature, and Statistics. Teacher James Evans gives Candace his highest recommendation noting she is creative, relational, and very motivated.
